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Introduction

What is "the blessed life"?

A loving marriage? Obedient children? A healthy body? A successful career? Trusted friends? Financial abundance? Do achieving these qualities mean we are #blessed?

What happens when we don't experience these qualities in our lives?

How does this "blessed life" line up with how Jesus defines blessedness?

In Matthew 5:1-12, Jesus redefines what blessedness looks like in our lives. It turns out that it's way better than we could ever dream of on our own.

As we go through this RbC Sermon Series, #Blessed, all the way up to thanksgiving, we will investigate one of the most recognized, least understood, and rarely followed teachings of Jesus.

At the end of each week's discussion, there are THREE questions that will show up consistently. These questions will hit on three major themes: how the Beatitudes are at the core of God, how Jesus redefines blessedness, and how blessedness impacts the privilege of shared faith.

7) After the sermon and the LIFEgroup discussion, what does poor in spirit have to do with God?
8) How has Jesus challenged your picture of what it means to be #blessed this week?
9) How does this redefined picture of blessedness impact how we communicate the love of Jesus to our community?
